The Sacrament of Baptism

We welcome new life into the Church through the sacramental sign of Baptism which is celebrated **every Sunday of the month at 1:00pm** with the exception of Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. We encourage parents who wish to have their child baptized to call the Parish Secretary, Michele O'Toole, at 609-702-1848 ext. 301 or stop in and pick up a Baptism packet.

Once the Baptismal Preparation class is attended, the form completed and the Godparent Eligibility Certificates are turned in then a date for your child's Baptism will be set.

Baptismal Preparation

Catholic Godparents are required to complete an Eligibility Certificate and have the certificates signed by the pastor of the parish where they are currently registered and practicing their faith.

We offer a Baptismal Prep Class for parents as a way of preparing them for their child's journey of faith. Classes are scheduled for the first Wednesday of every month at 7:30pm. Please contact the Parish Secretary to register.

Sacramental Sponsorship Letter

This is a form required to be a Godparent or Sponsor for Baptism or Confirmation. To receive this form the following requirements must be met:

- If married, be in a valid marriage according to the laws of the Catholic Church.
- Be at least 16 years of age.
- Completed the Sacraments of Initiation; Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation
- Be a registered, active participant of a Parish.

The Sacrament of Marriage

Couples wishing to celebrate and consecrate their love in the Sacrament of Marriage are asked to call the Parish Secretary, Michele O'Toole at 609-702-1848 ext. 301.

Arrangements are to be made with the Pastor a year in advance of the requested date. At least one person should be a registered member of the parish. All couples are required to attend preparation sessions.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick

Any Catholic who is seriously ill, advanced in age, or who feels the need for the comforting presence of the Church's sacramental prayer life may be anointed. Please contact the Parish Office at 609-702-1848 ext. 301 during office hours. In the case of an emergency, please call and follow the instructions listed on our telephone message.

The Grapes of Wrath Project

The hot summer is here and the time is right to enjoy a tall, cold drink and read Steinbeck's classic novel, *The Grapes of Wrath*. In this sobering story about the Great Depression of the 1930's, you will be moved and challenged by its passionate message and it will stay with you long after you finish the book.

In order to appreciate Steinbeck's work, let's look at a significant theme of the novel: *Man's Inhumanity to Man.*

Steinbeck consistently points to the fact that the families' great suffering is caused not by bad weather or mere misfortune but by their fellow human beings. Historical, social, and economic circumstances separate people into rich and poor, landowner and tenant, and the people in the dominant roles struggle viciously to preserve their positions. For example, in his brief history of California in Chapter 19, Steinbeck portrays the state as the product of land-hungry squatters who took the land from Mexicans and, by working it and making it produce, rendered it their own. Now, generations later, the California landowners see this historical example as a threat, since they believe that the influx of migrant farmers might cause history to repeat itself. In order to protect themselves from such danger, the landowners create a system in which the migrants are treated like animals, shuffled from one filthy roadside camp to the next, denied livable wages, and forced to turn against their brethren simply to survive. The novel draws a simple line through the population – one that divides the privileged from the poor – and identifies that division as the primary source of evil and suffering in the world.

So, begin your reading of *The Grapes of Wrath* and save the date, Friday evening - September 15 (7pm) - when we will gather to see John Ford's classic movie version and discuss both novel and film. Look for updates about the novel in future Parish Bulletins.

Living the Good News Today

“Whoever loses his life for My sake will find it.”

This year, our oldest granddaughter graduated from 8th grade. Our youngest son and his wife had a celebration at their house—an outdoor BBQ attended by many family members and friends. As we shared the excellent food and lively company, my husband Jeff and I mingled with several of the young parents who had attended. The mother of one of our granddaughter’s classmates started an interesting conversation about the challenges of being a parent when peer pressure is being exerted to buy very expensive articles of clothing and personal possessions (specifically, she focused on sneakers and sweatshirts). We were very impressed with her earnest focus on teaching her children good values and how to acquire a discipline for their lives that can differentiate between what is necessity and frivolity.

Whether we realize it or not, these simple moments of fellowship are opportunities for evangelization (to spread the message of the Gospel) and affirmation. In this weekend’s Gospel account, St. Matthew tells us that a follower of Jesus will have to make difficult choices. He quotes Jesus telling His apostles that we will be required to take up our crosses and follow Him. What effect did it have on the apostles to hear these words: *“Whoever loses his life for My sake will find it”*? Do Christ’s words have an effect on our lives today? Do we want to be *“dead to sin”*?

The young mother at the graduation party was grappling with something common to many families: living a meaningful life in spite of the excessive materialism of our culture. Because of advertisements and social media, it is too easy to be bombarded by recommendations of things we **must** acquire and **possess** to have a good life. Jesus, on the other hand, asks us to lose our lives. Let’s be clear: He is not referring to early physical death or suicide! From our baptism, the Holy Spirit calls us to a life of ongoing conversion of heart and mind, so that we deliberately choose to follow God above all other desires.

The week after our encounter with the young mother, I received an e-mail from a man that I met in my early years of prison ministry, who is now serving his second sentencing in a federal prison. Over more than 18 years that we have shared our faith, I have watched him rise and fall through some serious life challenges, including attempted suicide during his first incarceration. His most recent e-mail exchange dealt with his frustration on how to be a good absentee father to his two stepchildren and his toddler son. All of his questions were good ones. Understanding that the world offers many distractions and wrong attractions, he wanted to know how he could draw

the children closer to God. This is a challenge faced even within families where a parent is not incarcerated!

Although he was asking whether or not there were spiritual books that could make a difference, he understood that the time and values that parents teach to their children, by personal example, mean far more than having children read a book or watch an inspiring movie. When I gave him some suggestions about books, though, this on-line description of one of my favorite Christian authors (Max Lucado) resonated:

“It’s Not About Me—Teen Edition: Pop culture and psychobabble tell us to **make ourselves the center of the universe in order to be happy**. Churches have communicated the false idea that God exists to give us all that we selfishly want. In this book, Max Lucado reminds us that it’s not about us, it’s all about God. It is through this shift in thinking that we can truly live an unburdened, happy life.”

On the feast day of St. Anthony (June 13th), a Franciscan Doctor of the Church, Pope Francis issued a message inaugurating the first World Day of the Poor to be celebrated on the 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time (November 19th). Throughout his message, the Holy Father gives examples of how we can lose our life—for others—by seeing Christ in them. For our youth to turn away from \$130 sneakers and \$95 sweatshirts, the adults in their lives must show them God’s way that inspires compassion and service. Pope Francis raises the bar to experience life in Christ through encounter:

“We may think of the poor simply as the beneficiaries of our occasional volunteer work, or of impromptu acts of generosity that appease our conscience. However good and useful such acts may be for making us sensitive to people’s needs and the injustices that are often their cause, they ought to lead to a true encounter with the poor and a sharing that becomes a way of life...This way of life gives rise to joy and peace of soul, because we touch with our own hands the flesh of Christ. If we truly wish to encounter Christ, we have to touch His body in the suffering bodies of the poor, as a response to the sacramental communion bestowed in the Eucharist. The Body of Christ, broken in the sacred liturgy, can be seen, through charity and sharing, in the faces and persons of the most vulnerable of our brothers and sisters.”

Just as St. Paul urged the Romans to think of themselves as *“living for God in Christ Jesus,”* we can also leave weekend worship with that same mindset, heeding the reminder of Pope Francis to *“Let us love, not with words but with deeds.”* A transforming daily message is simply:

“For ever I will sing the goodness of the Lord.”
